Dear Dave,

AAGC is pleased to provide the final report due under our agreement with the Zilker Botanical Garden Conservancy – a summary of educational programs offered to the public.

As the attached narrative demonstrates, education is at the heart of what our 30 member clubs see as their mission. Despite the challenges of an ongoing pandemic, AAGC clubs delivered more than 117 individual programs, workshops and presentations.

Pandemic continued to have its effect as clubs could not hold their programs at the Garden Center, and some clubs were unable to continue their efforts at all. Most showed the resilience AAGC has shown since its inception in 1955, and found ways to continue their educational efforts by going virtual.

The number of people reached was 2,829. This is probably a conservative number. Many clubs recorded their programs and made them available online afterwards. Others produced new programs on video, and we don't have an accurate number of how many people were reached through this media. We also know the shows and exhibits clubs put on is another way to educate the public about what makes an iris, an orchid or a rose an "award winner." A few clubs were able to hold these events before the pandemic shut things down and provided one-on-one education in these settings.

The report of our educational programs would not be complete without noting the other part of what AAGC contributes to the Zilker Botanical Garden through its agreement with ZBGC, and that is our volunteer effort. Based on the volunteer reports submitted over the past year – 3,340 hours were spent on education - developing program content, and publicizing it through newsletters, websites and social media, with one of our main vehicles of promotion being the ZBG website. ***Our clubs' commitment to education represents almost 31 percent of our overall volunteer hours of 10,870.***

In the coming year, AAGC intends to work with club to assist them in doing formal evaluations and assessments of their programming. Several clubs such as Austin Pond Society noted that they relied on "*Good responses from all attendees, but had not done any specific assessments.*"

The Austin Herb Society did a survey of members asking them to rate the last two years of their educational programming. Findings from 35 responses indicated ratings between "1" as "Loved It," and "2" as "Good," with average response 1.5. Those results like the anecdotal information gathered by other clubs was used to shape programming for FY 2021.

On behalf of our Executive Committee, officers and members of our 30 clubs, AAGC looks forward to our continued partnership with ZBGC to benefit Zilker Botanical Garden.

Report on Educational Activities
Fiscal Year Oct. 1, 2019—Sept. 30, 2020

The Austin Area Garden Center mission is to “promote the education of citizens and youth in the art of gardening.” This fits in well with the COA’s Activity Objective for Zilker Botanical Garden, which is “to provide horticultural displays and programs that enhance the beauty of public spaces and increase knowledge about plants” as well as Zilker Botanical Garden Conservancy’s mission of “Inspiring people of all ages to treasure, promote, and protect the botanical wonders of our world.”

Austin residents of the past felt a need for a Garden Center. They thought that their efforts would be more effective if they had a building to meet in, so six garden clubs joined together, raised funds and built the Garden Center, completing it in 1964. The hope and excitement of both gardeners and city officials was evident in newspaper articles of the time.

Gardening, nature and art education is provided by our member clubs. Currently, 30 member clubs fulfill our education mission through their programs, most of which are free and open to the public. Some of the topics from AAGC’s adult educational activities are listed below.

The **Austin Area Begonia Society** shares the Aims and Purposes of the American Begonia Society, which have guided that organization since its founding by Herbert P. Dyckman in 1932.

- * To stimulate and promote interest in begonias and other shade-loving plants.
- * To encourage the introduction and development of new types of these plants.
- * To share information in regard to kinds, propagation, and culture of begonias and companion plants.
- * To bring into friendly contact all who love and grow begonias.

The purpose of the **Iris Society of Austin** shall be to support scientific research, including the culture and improvement of irises, and to encourage garden visiting by the general public; to collect and disseminate information on the history, classification, hybridization, climatic range, and culture of irises; to promote shows and exhibitions for the purpose of educating the general public and fellow irisarians; to educate the public through public display gardens, published standards for judging, and local, area, regional and national meetings open to the public; and to do all possible to advance the cause of the American Iris Society.

Plein Air Austin was established in 2001 by a group of Austin artists who had been meeting regularly to paint in the many local parks and natural areas for which the Texas Hill Country is so well-known. In 2006 a board of directors was established and membership was formalized in the hope that the group would flourish and become a respected organization representing talented outdoor painters in Texas and beyond. In 2007, Plein Air Austin gained its 501c3 Nonprofit status and in 2017 joined the Austin Area Garden Center, Inc.
